

## **Johnny Chi Lane & Shady Lane Mall**

In Chinatown, Johnny Chi Lane and Shady Lane are little pedestrian only open-air malls with a variety of different shops. On Sunday's are some little stalls on Johnny Chi Lane, selling handcraft and other things.

**Map Reference:** Connecting Carnarvon Street and Dampier Terrace in Chinatown

**Location: access** from Carnarvon Street and Dampier Terrace, Chinatown

**Opening hours:** Shops 9.00am – 5.00pm  
Sunday market on Johnny Chi Lane 9.00am – 12.00pm

**Closest accessible parking:** One dedicated disable-parking bay on Carnarvon St at the entrance to Johnny Chi Lane.

**Pick up / set down bay:** No

**Closest Public transport:**

- Town Bus stop on Carnarvon Street next to Male Oval
- Town Bus stop on Dampier Terrace, 3 minutes away

**Closest accessible toilet:** Nearest disabled toilet is the public toilet on Carnarvon Street at Male Oval.

**Signage:** Easy to read Signage with good colour contrast.

**Path to Attraction:** There are 5 wheelchair accessible entries to the complex. 2 from Dampier Tce, 2 from Carnarvon St. One is leading into Johnny Chi Lane and the other into Shady Lane. Shady Lane can also be accessed from the Roebuck Bay car-park.

**Path through attraction:** The laneways itself are brick, wide and barrier free, so that wheelchair shoppers should not experience too much inconvenience. But there are some odd loose paving bricks due to tree roots. The complex is on several levels with ramps of varying degrees with the steepest one of 10 degrees. (Y)

There are a few benches in shady areas to rest, and the Shady Lane Café in the complex offers refreshments and food.
