Closest public transport: Town Bus Stop right in front of the showroom.

Closest accessible toilet: Onsite.

Signage: Good clear signage visible from the street. There is directional signage on Challenore Drive footpath.

External access: A barrier free pedestrian path 1400mm wide with slight gradient of 4 (1.14) leads to the entrance on Challenor Drive. The entry from the car park is also barrier free with enough room for all types of wheelchairs.

Main entrance: Both entrances have double swing doors with 'D' handles. The doors are 900mm wide each side, making a 1800mm wide entry. The Challenor Drive entry is generally kept open.

Internal: The floor is vinyl. Displays and counter are at sitting height. Wheelchair circulation is good as there is ample space between each display. There is seating available with chairs having backrests and armrests with a seat height of 450mm.

Displays: Retail shelves are located at sitting height.

Payment / service counters: At sitting height.

Cueing system: Counter service operates by the customer service staff calling 'next please'. There are no visual prompts.

Accessible toilet: There is an accessible male and female toilet located in the Willie Creek and Old Zoo Café car park.
