SUMMARY: Minyirr Park seeks Shire support for the purchase of a Kanga GA 524 loader to assist on ground staff with maintenance of walking trails and recreational areas within the park.

BACKGROUND

With three major walking trails to maintain in Minyirr Park- the Lurajarri heritage Dreaming Trail, Minyirr Park and Nabula, there is considerable track maintenance to be undertaken, particularly during the Kimberley wet season when plant life undergoes vigorous growth. The Minyirr Park work team maintain all of the walk trails, on foot, which takes a great deal of time and effort. With severe cutbacks in staff numbers with the loss of CDEP, Minyirr Park urgently require the use of a Kanga Loader to assist with track and park maintenance. The Kanga Loader can be purchased with a range of attachments, such as grinder and slasher auxiliary kit. These additional attachments would allow the machine to be used for track clearance, slashing, rubbish removal and increased opportunities for 'eyes on the ground' supervision, with the machine allowing quicker access throughout the extensive park.

COMMENT

Minyirr Park would like to discuss the idea of Broome Shire Council purchasing a Kanga Loader in a shared arrangement that would allow usage by the Minyirr Park team for necessary Park maintenance. This arrangement would allow safe garaging of the Kanga Loader and ongoing maintenance to be performed by trained Shire staff.

SUMMARY: Signage in Minyirr Park requires upgrading, with the artwork on the signs faded and difficult to interpret. Minyirr Park would also like to enter into discussion with Shire about the wording and symbols for new signage on Minyirr Beach, with on the beach including vehicle incursions, turtle nesting and spiritual significance of the area.

BACKGROUND

The Broome Shire Council has in the past assisted Minyirr Park with funding of signage for the Park, with wider community utilising the park regularly for recreation. With the passage of time these signs have deteriorated such that they are becoming difficult to read and interpret. Minyirr Park would like to replace the signage in the Park, entering into discussion with the Shire about any changes to the wording and artwork.

SUMMARY: Minyirr Park is planning to revise the names in the Zones of Opportunity. The plan is to replace outdated names, with appropriate Yawuru names. Changing these names is culturally important and practical, as many of the old names are no longer relevant or appropriate.

BACKGROUND

Many of the names in the Zones of Opportunity do not reflect the cultural heritage of the Park, moreover, many of the names have become obsolete. Minyirr Park would like to rename the Zones of Opportunity to reflect the Yawuru cultural heritage. With many improvements occurring in the Park, including rubbish removal, regeneration, walk trails, dance grounds and Youth Camp, it is important that the naming of the Zones of Opportunity reflect the dynamic nature of Park improvements and cultural heritage. The renaming of the Zones of Opportunity will also make it a lot easier for reporting on ground works for the Annual Shire Report.

6.4 TURTLE NESTING ON CABLE BEACH

SUMMARY: Ongoing turtle monitoring on Cable Beach involving Conservation Volunteers Australia and the wider community has revealed that endangered turtles continue to return to their place of birth to lay their eggs. Unfortunately there have been some very unfortunate incidents, with people looking for hatchlings at night in their cars, and in the process running over the young turtles. There has also been a very aggressive incident involving intoxicated young men, shining their car headlights on a turtle trying to nest on the beach, despite onlooker's advice not to do so. Rubibi is as you are aware, urges Broome Shire Council to take a progressive stand on this matter, making a complete ban of vehicles driving on the beach from Gantheaume Point to Coconut Wells.

BACKGROUND

Vehicles can damage marine turtle nests and nesting habitat by compacting sand, crushing nests and creating wheel ruts that impede or trap hatchlings. Disorientation of turtle hatchlings is caused by vehicles driving on the beach at night time during nesting (and hatching) season (Nov-March). Such activity has been well documented as severely impacting on survival success. As stated by Leslie Baird from Chelonia Wildlife Rehabilitation Centre who has rehabilitated and released several turtles found sick or injured on Cable Beach, "the hatchlings are lured to their death by lights and fires on beaches and die of exhaustion whilst trying to struggle across tyre tracks in the sand as tiny hatchlings on their way to the sea." It is well known that the 'vehicle driving' section of Cable beach is a nesting ground for several turtles, notably the green turtle, flat back turtle and possibly the loggerhead. Under the Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 the loggerhead turtle (*Caretta caretta*) is listed as endangered and the Green turtle (*Chelonia mydas*), leatherback (*Dermochelys coriacea*) and hawksbill turtle (*Eretmochelys imbricata*) are all listed as vulnerable. Therefore any stretch of beach where such species are known to nest is critical to their survival.

Moreover, driving on the beach north of the rocks at the vehicle access at Cable Beach Reserve is also disrespectful to Aboriginal people and their culture, undermining significant Aboriginal sites protected under the WA Heritage Act of 1972 and the cultural integrity of the coast.

COMMENT

This matter needs to be considered as part of the development of the Cable Beach Vehicle Management Plan which will include consultation with all Stakeholders including Rubibi.
