

#### The Study

The Shire of Broome commissioned CATALYSE® to conduct a MARKYT® Community Scorecard during June 2020.


Scorecard invitations were sent to 2,035 ratepayers by email and hard copy scorecards were sent to all households via unaddressed mail. The Shire of Broome provided supporting promotions through its communication channels.

826 residents in the Shire of Broome completed a scorecard. A further 147 out of area ratepayers and visitors, and 73 Council affiliated respondents participated bringing the total to **1,046 respondents**.

As analysis of results showed significant differences between these groups, the main body of this report presents responses from the residents sample only. This is consistent with the approach for other Local Governments.

The final dataset was weighted by age and gender to match the ABS Census population profile.

Data has been analysed using SPSS. Where sub-totals add to ±1% of the parts, this is due to rounding errors to zero decimal places.



#### MARKYT Industry Standards

CATALYSE® has conducted studies for 60+ councils. When councils ask comparable questions, we publish the high and average scores to enable participating councils to recognise and learn from the industry leaders. In this report, the 'high score' is calculated from **WA Councils** that have completed an accredited study with CATALYSE® within the past three years. Participating councils are listed below.







#### **Community Voices**

"Antisocial behaviour – violence, aggressive behaviour, drunkenness, drug abuse, rock throwing."

"We have huge social issues in Broome stemming from alcohol abuse and alcoholism of itinerant people that have massive follow on consequences from domestic violence, juvenile delinquency, petty crimes (theft and vandalism) and littering."

"Safety for children in regards to the environment -dogs, broken glass, syringes"

"Personal Safety & antisocial behaviour. If we don't nip this in the bud now, many more people will leave and Our reputation will be further tarnished as a tourist destination."

"more police patrols, more lighting, less Government Housing or at least some decent tenants, and a zero tolerance to the violence and mayhem... the shire need to hold the Housing Dept accountable for their tenants and the damage being done to our town."

"More lights in parks and some of the unsafe areas of town. Maybe some security patrols around the less desirable areas to try and help curb the crime. More activities to try and engage youth whom may not have a stable home life."

"Anti Social Behaviour. Itinerants moved on quickly. Curfew for kids that have no adult supervision with them. Cashless card. Drinking register. Street lights throughout old Broome. All these will equal and help our basic human right to feeling and being safe."

"Endorsing or creating a[n] environment where young law breakers are placed on land to learn their culture, how to respect their elders/people and animals - work for a change to earn their keep and reward good behaviour instead of bad. (instead of institutions - seems to be a revolving door in Broome that doesn't work nor does the slap on the wrist)."

"Shire needs to do more lobbying for harsher penalties for juvenile crime."

"Education of parents of said minors about their responsibilities to their offspring."

#### **Community Voices**

"Safe boat launching - we have one of the highest boat registrations in Australia and one of the worst boat launching facilities - launching in Broome is dangerous."

"The Broome Boating Facility needs to become reality - it will be a great, sustainable boost to the economy."

"Safe boat ramps. Fish cleaning stations."

"Boating facilities for recreation and tourism."

"Boating facilities. Slipway development for more maintenance opportunities."

"Better /safer boating facilities - many other towns with the same tide issues that occur here have SAFE boat ramps that suit the tides and protect the environment as well as fishing stations where people can scale/ fillet fish."

"Boat ramps! All tied boat ramps. Fishing is the most popular sporting activity in your community and you have failed all of the people that partake in that sport! Provide a safe all weather, all tied boat ramp."

"Registered boat ramps that prevent salt water on vehicles."

"Broome has pathetically woeful and dangerous boat launching options and for a town of this size and the amount of boats per capita its disgraceful."

"A safe all tide recreational boat ramp. Boaters, especially tourists feel unsafe and do not read the conditions appropriately."

"Future proposed Coastal developments such as boat ramps, new Jetties and a buried seawall at Cable Beach need to be accompanied by environmental impact assessments before the Shire asks the community if these are good ideas."

"Encourage Big Business back to town to generate real employment opportunities and real wages not concentrating on tourism and hospitality, which only provides minimum wages and seasonal casual work and a lack of long-term growth..."

"Targeted Major Infrastructure projects to provide work for the local small business and allow the Kimberley to grow effectively- a structured plan and execution of it."

"De-risking investment opportunities for long-term projects that improve social and economic wellbeing to the residents of Broome. Getting on immediately with bring[ing] economic improvements and working with businesses to make sure they have the towns strategy in mind when they deliver products and services."

"Timely procedures and processing of planning and building approvals to facilitate the economy of the Shire."

"Promote diversification of the Broome economy but not at the expense of existing sectors...Instill a "can do" attitude in all departments, particularly planning and building."

"A complete change of attitude related to local developments and business start ups such that the staff at the Shire encourage and assist residents rather than seeing their role as regulators and enforcers.... the biggest impediment to business in Broome..."

"Small business support and incentives (so people can afford to live here)."

"Protecting, supporting and promoting Broome as a Dinosaur wonderland will be a great boost to our tourist economy."

- Youth unemployment.
- Youth boredom contributing to anti-social behaviour and a high rate of juvenile crime.

- 2. Invest in safe places, facilities and programs to engage youth such as basketball, water park, BMX, motor cross, etc.
- 3. Provide a local detention facility that is on country and provides training in life skills and job skills relevant to the local region.

#### **Community Voices**

"As a Shire with the highest rate of juvenile crime...there is a distinct lack of facilities and programs to keep kids busy."

"Sending kids 2300kms away to Banksia Hill Detention Centre is just an apprenticeship in becoming a career criminal."

"Push State Government for a youth detention facility in the Kimberley where kids can stay on country and learn life and job skills relevant to the region.

Horticulture, agriculture, agriculture, etc."

"An effort to get the youth into planning for the environment and recycling programmes which are non-existent."

"12 to 25 year olds need resources. Activities other than sport or fishing and camping, especially males. There is nothing here for them."

"More places for 12-18 year olds available in the evening as well. An aqua park (amusement park) which would include slides (water) maybe built at the old Croc park."

"I would like to see a Yawuru painted basketball court with lighting where the new bicycle track is next to the Boulevard, as well as a cultural centre to attract youths."


"Engaging with youth. Although there has been noticeable effort recently there is still a need to focus more on facilities for youth and families."








