Warning over mosquito risk

Mosquito numbers in Broome could rise due to recent heavy rain and big tides, according to Shire of Broome Health Services.

The Shire's wet season mosquito surveillance and control program found that heavy rain in January followed by a hot, dry spell showed very low numbers of mosquitoes through February and only one notification of mosquito-borne disease in Broome.

However, Senior Environmental Health Officer, Chantal Spittle, says the community should remain vigilant during outdoor activities to prevent mosquito-borne diseases like Ross River and Barmah Virus.

"Our trapping history shows that salt marsh mosquitoes and midge populations have the potential to become active and increase following the March high tide," Ms Spittle says.

"We now have both freshwater mosquitoes, which are dawn and dusk biters, and salt marsh mosquitoes which are aggressive bitters and have the tendency to bite during most of the day."

Precautions include wearing loose-fitting clothing and applying repellent containing DEET.

The following simple steps will also help protect the community by reducing mosquito numbers:

- Empty buckets and dog water bowls each week;
- · Check tyres, pot plants and other water containers
- Introduce fish to ornamental ponds;
- Fill pot plant saucers with sand to prevent pooling
- Maintain household swimming pools with chlorine and keep clean;
- Pooling water from reticulation can provide a yearround water source for mosquitoes to breed, and ensure leaking taps and hoses are not pooling.
- Create a frog-friendly garden to naturally control mosquitoes.

Community help sought in fight against weeds

Weeds threaten native vegetation and biodiversity, and the entire community has a role to play in reducing their impact on the natural environment.

Parks and Gardens Technical Officer, Clint Hankinson, says the Shire puts in considerable work controlling weeds on public land, but the community needs to help control them on private property.

"Caltrop is a very invasive weed and once established it's very hard to get rid of due to its vigorous growth and the seed staying viable for many years," Mr Hankinson says.


"This spreading prostrate annual is characterised by yellow flowers that produce an aggressive, woody prickle that punctures bare feet and bicycle tyres, and is a problem on verges and all pedestrian traffic areas around Broome.

"The best method for complete control is removing the whole plant by any means possible before the seed has

Economic development on the menu at Business Breakfast

Indigenous economic opportunities, progress on the Broome Road Industrial Estate, and unlocking the door to Broome's future will be key topics at the latest Shire of Broome Business Breakfast Series event on Friday.

Keynote speakers will be Melissa Hartmann from Morrgul to speak about Indigenous economic opportunities and funding; John Hackett from Landcorp to update progress on the Broome Road Industrial Estate; and Russell Barnett from Australian Venture Consultants who will speak on Broome Future Limited – unlocking the door.

Shire of Broome CEO, Kenn Donohoe, says other recent economic development initiatives include working with the Chamber of Commerce, Visitor Centre and others to service cruise ship visitors, with Council providing \$15,000 in 2015, and \$10,000 earmarked for next year.

"The Shire has also hosted a delegation from Vietnam looking at investment opportunities, and facilitated meetings and site visits with stakeholders," Mr Donohoe

"The Shire's new Manager of Economic Development, Daniel High, is on board and is progressing projects including the Chinatown redevelopment with Landcorp and the Kimberley Development Commission, development of an Economic Development Strategy, and creation of a Shire of Broome Investment Prospectus."
