

## Stewart St upgrades

Work is set to start on a major upgrade of busy Stewart St alongside the Broome Courthouse.

Work on the stretch of Stewart St between Hamersley St and Weld St will include upgrading street lighting, adding formalised parking bays, improving drainage, and constructing footpaths on both sides of the road as well as creating a new footpath link along Weld St to Frederick St.

Stewart St receives considerable vehicle and foot traffic especially during the popular Courthouse Markets each weekend, and the upgrade will significantly improve safety and amenity.

Work is expected to be underway within two weeks, and take about six weeks to complete. Traffic management will be in place including road closures and detours during critical phases of the work to ensure the safety of workers and road users.

## Underground drainage to improve safety

The last of a series of open drains in Old Broome is now being undergrounded to improve safety and allow future development.

Local contractor Jetridge Holdings is undertaking the work on the Conti Foreshore directly south of Catalina Pl.

The aim of the project is to construct an underground drainage system that poses no danger or safety risk to the community and is constructed in a way that allows possible future development in the area in line with Council's Old Broome Development Strategy.

## Chinatown role a boost for business

Chinatown traders and businesses are set to benefit from the appointment of a Chinatown Investment and Development Coordinator as part of the Chinatown Revitalisation Project.

The \$12.6 million project, made possible by \$10 million through Royalties for Regions, \$2 million from the Shire of Broome and \$600,000 from Tourism WA, is being delivered by the Shire, Kimberley Development Commission and LandCorp to increase activity in Chinatown through major improvements to street, landscape, facilities and laneways over the next two years, and conduct feasibility studies on three long-term transformation projects.

Jeremy Macmath has been appointed to the role and his responsibilities include developing a two-year commercial activation strategy to create and market events, activities and promotions that increase activity in Chinatown in conjunction with local business.

He will also develop a laneways strategy to bring existing and new laneways to life, including grant funding to help tenants and landowners activate their laneways.

Broome Shire President, Ron Johnston, says the position was created to not only ensure local businesses and landowners are kept informed every step of the way, but also to encourage people to undertake their own events and activities which can be supported through the project.

## Pre-cyclone rubbish collection coming soon

The Shire will again offer a free pre-cyclone rubbish collection in residential areas to begin on 31 Oct.

The purpose of the collection is to remove from households any items that could become dangerous in a cyclone, and a strict set of guidelines applies. Waste should be put on verges by October 30, with collection starting on October 31.

Items that will be collected include white goods, furniture, household electrical items and scrap metal.

Items that won't be collected include car parts such as tyres and batteries, asbestos, oil, chemicals and green waste.
