Busy Chinatown Discovery Festival weekend a big hit



Broome celebrated an action-packed three days of fun, culture and togetherness as the Chinatown Discovery Festival drew in big crowds last weekend.

Large numbers of residents and visitors flooded into our town centre as the community celebration kicked off on Friday and ran through to Sunday.

This year's theme was 'Growing up in Chinatown' and there were plenty of activities that celebrated Broome's amazing history and heritage.

The festival concluded with the ever-popular PEARLERS' Games on Dampier Terrace, with fun and frivolity keeping the sizeable crowd entertained.

Shire of Broome deputy president Desiree Male said that with the first race round also taking place at the Broome Turf Club on Saturday, it was

a big weekend for the town.

"Given that last year's Discovery Festival was cancelled due to COVID-19 and associated restrictions, it was wonderful to see our community come together over a big weekend of celebration," she said.

"The program had something for everyone, with most of the events free to the community and lots of family-friendly activities available.

"Different community groups and businesses rallied together to provide events and festivities for attendees - Chinatown was alive with activity.

Construction works progressing to final stages



Stage Two of the Chinatown Revitalisation Project is progressing well, with the end of construction in sight.

After installing our new public art centrepiece, Fusion, at the roundabout on the corners of Napier Terrace and Carnarvon Street, other pieces are being rolled out across the precinct.

Another milestone for the project has been the placing of trees and plants by the Shire's parks and gardens crew.

Grown locally by the Shire horticulture team over many months, the associated photo shows some of the greenery proudly in place on Short Street East.

Shire of Broome deputy president Desiree Male said the vision of a revitalised Chinatown was close to completion.

"It has been fantastic to see some of the amazing public art being installed, while the Shire growing our own trees and plants, rather than purchasing them, has saved ratepayers thousands of dollars," she said.

"It was really pleasing to see everyone in Chinatown over the weekend for the Discovery Festival and the end of the project is certainly in sight.

"I'd encourage the community to continue supporting our impacted local retailers and thank you for your patience as the final pieces of the puzzle are put into place."
