Shire offers safety rebates

SECURITY INCENTIVE SCHEME

As part of the Shire of Broome's Community Safety Plan, a new Security Incentive Scheme (SIS) will start in August 2021



Rebates to residents for the purchase of home security products will cover 50 per cent of the cost (75 per cent for seniors and healthcare card holders), with a maximum reimbursement of \$275

- Security sensor lights • Security screened doors • Security window screens

The Shire of Broome has introduced a new community safety initiative, with a rebate scheme to encourage residents to purchase home security products.

The Security Incentive Scheme started earlier this month and sees the Shire reimburse eligible residents who purchase home security devices.

The rebate will cover 50 per cent of the cost of purchasing the security product (75 per cent for seniors and healthcare card holders), with the maximum reimbursement \$275 (including GST).

The following devices are eligible:

- CCTV cameras
- home intruder alarms
- door deadlocks
- keyed window locks
- security sensor lights
- security screened doors
- security window screens

Interested residents are invited to fill out an application by searching 'rebate' at www.broome.wa.gov.au.

Shire officers will assess applications and notify applicants if they have been successful or not.

Successful applicants will have three months to purchase and install their device of choice, before providing a receipt to the Shire for reimbursement.

Final touches of Chinatown project being applied



The vast majority of work in Stage Two of the Chinatown Revitalisation Project has been completed, with Broome's town centre rejuvenated over the last six months.

Roads and footpaths are all open, although the team still has minor works to complete in small sections of the precinct.

A major landmark for the project occurred last week, with the installation of Japanese lighting pillars on Napier Terrace (pictured).

Our electricians are working on wiring them up, with the finished product promising to be stunning.

The Shire's Parks and Gardens team have been busy finding our fresh plants and trees a new

home, with the whole precinct looking fantastic as a result.

Shire of Broome president Harold Tracey said Chinatown was looking great.

"We are firmly in the final stage of the project and I can't wait until we can remove all the temporary fencing and fully reopen Chinatown once again," he said.

"Having events in Chinatown over the Shinju Matsuri Festival will be great, with lots of new spaces for activation and events.

"I'd like to say a big thank you again to all of our wonderful retailers in Chinatown and the general community for your patience."
