Selfless funding contributions a ray of light for Broome sport



Broome's sporting community now has extra opportunities for training and competition after the recent completion of two lighting projects.

The Shire of Broome has installed new lighting at both the Nipper Roe Sports Field at BRAC and the Pump Track.

The \$1.4 million Nipper Roe eight-pole field lighting system is designed to meet the AFL Preferred Facility Guidelines of 150 lux.

The project was funded by the Shire, the State Government's Community Sport and Recreation Facilities Fund (CSRFF), the AFL's Facility Funding Program and through a contribution received from Development WA.

Broome contractor Able Electrical completed the upgrade, supporting the Shire's objective to engage local businesses.

The \$130,000 Pump Track lighting project was funded by the Federal Government's Safer Community Fund.

The Pump Track project was completed last October thanks to funding from the Shire, the State

Government's CSRFF, Development WA and the Commonwealth Bank.

Local companies McCorry Brown, H&M Tracey, MNG and Roadline also kindly provided in-kind works at no cost.

Shire of Broome president Harold Tracey said improving sporting infrastructure had been a priority in recent years.

"The Nipper Roe Lighting installation was essential to facilitate the continued growth in participation in field sports and optimisation of the entire BRAC playing fields," he said.

"The lights are live and oval bookings are already locked in ahead of the busy dry season sporting calendar.

"Having additional lighting at the Pump Track and Nipper Roe oval gives the community peace of mind for evening sports.

"It is exciting to see what further recreation upgrades are to come in the future, to provide a future for everyone in Broome sport."

Precinct Plans - Register your interest to be involved

The Shire of Broome is about to embark on a review of the development strategies for Cable Beach and Chinatown/Old Broome.

The review of these development strategies will result in the preparation of two new precinct plans for the Cable Beach and Chinatown/Old Broome Precincts.

A Precinct Plan is a planning tool used to guide areas that have been identified for more intensity of development to ensure they are carefully planned, designed and developed to achieve good building, open space and transport outcomes.

The development of the precinct plans may result in changes to the Shire's existing planning controls and we want the community to be a part of the process.

There will be several ways the community can get involved; information on dates and times will follow:

- Visioning and values - An opportunity for you to share your thoughts and ideas on what you value about these areas and your vision for the future.
- Design development - An opportunity to provide input and feedback on design concept options for the precincts which would be incorporated into the precinct plans.
- Draft precinct plans - An opportunity to provide feedback on the draft precinct plans when they are advertised for public comment.

While every stage of the engagement is important, we strongly encourage people to participate early when there is the greatest possible opportunity to help shape and inform the preparation of the precinct plans.
