Nominations now open for **Extraordinary Council Election**



SITUATION VACANT: The March 23 Extraordinary Election will result in a nine-member Council for the first time since October 2021.

Nominations have opened for candidates to run in the March 23 Local Government Extraordinary election for the remaining Shire of Broome Council seat vacated by former councillor Harold Tracey.

Candidates have until 4pm, Thursday, February 8, to lodge their nomination with the Western Australian Electoral Commission Returning Officer.

Nominations can be submitted at any time during the nomination period or between 2pm and 4pm on February 8 (close of nominations) at the Shire of Broome Administration Building at 27 Weld Street.

Candidates who stood in the October 2023 Ordinary Election but were unsuccessful are eligible to run again.

Potential candidates should note that this election is not for a full four-year term, as the seat was last decided in the 2021 Ordinary Election.

The seat will be up for re-election again at the next Ordinary Election in October 2025

The Broome Shire Council Extraordinary Election is one 18 to local government polls held across Western Australia in March and April 2024.

The elections will fill Council vacancies created during the last term that were not up for re-election at the October 2023 Ordinary Local Government Election.

Minister brings good news



State Minister for Police and Corrective Services Paul Papalia and his advisors took time out of their busy visit to the Kimberley last month to meet with Broome Shire President Chris Mitchell and Acting CEO Jeremy Hall.

Topics discussed included the Minister's announcement of the \$4 million two-year pilot program for the immediate Response Night Space, which has been launched in Broome to provide a place for children found wandering the town's streets at night.

The meeting's participants then attended a special meeting of the Broome Liquor Accord at the Shire Admin Building Function Room to discuss the Director of Liquor Licencing's plans for stricter alcohol restrictions in Broome and Derby.

Big screen giveaway

The Shire of Broome has donated about 70 surplus 24-inch computer monitors to not-for-profit organisations such as Broome PCYC and Nirrumbuk Aboriginal Corporation. Non-profit organisations and community-based groups and clubs that required monitors were invited to submit an expression of interest with information about their organisation and the number of screens required. The result was fantastic, with 14 organisations taking up the offer to claim the monitors to help run their offices or to provide educational services or internet access.
