Shire of Broome advocating for further Government investment in projects

Shire of Broome president Harold Tracey and chief executive officer Sam Mastrolembo have met with WA Premier Mark McGowan, Water Minister Dave Kelly and Tourism Minister Paul Papalia in recent weeks.

The Shire of Broome has had a number of excellent opportunities to advocate for the region and present potential future infrastructure projects to WA decisionmakers in recent weeks.

Shire president Harold Tracey and chief executive officer Sam Mastrolembo have held productive meetings with State politicians, with the 3-Year Broome COVID-19 Recovery Plan a key topic of conversation.

Compiled by the Shire in partnership with key local stakeholders, the plan details shovel-ready projects that could play a significant role in Broome's financial recovery and the town's continued positive evolution.

Premier Mark McGowan's visit to Broome on July 30 saw the State Government commit \$3 million towards the Shire's Town Beach jetty project, which will be the final puzzle piece in our overhaul of the precinct.

WA Tourism Minister Paul Papalia travelled to the Kimberley on August 2, while Water Minister Dave Kelly was in Broome on August 5 to announce a welcome \$33 million upgrade to local water treatment and usage infrastructure. Mr Mastrolembo and Councillor Chris Mitchell also met WA Transport Minister Rita Saffioti on August 6, who was briefed on the proposed Broome Boating Facility and is keen to receive the final Business Case for the project.

Cr Tracey said the Shire was encouraged by the State Government's recent investment in Broome and interest in further collaboration.

"The Shire has successfully partnered with the State Government for sizeable ongoing initiatives, such as the rejuvenation of Town Beach and the Chinatown Revitalisation Project," he said.

"The Premier was impressed by our 3-Year Broome COVID-19 Recovery Plan and certainly saw the merits of future projects that could stimulate our economy, create jobs and improve our town.

"Ratepayers should know that the Shire is actively advocating for Broome to State and Federal decisionmakers to help turn these projects into a reality."
