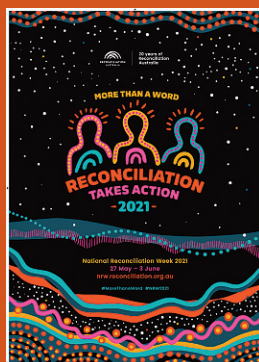

### National Reconciliation Week

The Shire of Broome will be marking Reconciliation Week 2021 with activities to be held at Town Beach on May 27.



National Reconciliation Week is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

Reconciliation Week is held May 27 to June 3 each year, with the 2021 theme 'More than a word. Reconciliation takes action.'

Partnered with the Broome Markets, there will be a traditional smoking ceremony, Indigenous musicians performing, interactive art activities and more from 4pm.

Bart Pigram from Narlijia Experiences will also be offering a cultural walking tour at 10am on May 27.

### Time to get active at BRAC

The final Dash & Splash event before the dry season hiatus will take place on Friday, May 28, with everyone welcome to participate.

Ideal for both seasoned athletes and first-timers, Dash & Splash is a duathlon run-swim event hosted by the Shire for the community.

Participants can choose to take part in the short course (2km run, 200m swim) or the long course (4km run, 400m swim), while you can compete as an individual or duo.

Juniors have the option to tackle the short course as a duo or compete against the adults in the long course as a pair, while parents and their child can also team up.

The final Dash & Splash event of the series is also the perfect warm-up for the BRAC 2 Beach Fun Run, which will take place next month.

To be held on Sunday, June 27, there are 4km and 8km courses and the event can be completed as a walk, run or wheelchair event.

The program includes art and photography installations, creative performances, music, food, sand sculptures, street entertainment and much more.

The key event is the Pearlers' Games, featuring fun challenges for individuals and teams, to round off a busy weekend of fun and activity in our town centre.

Shire of Broome deputy president Desiree Male said the Discovery Festival was a welcome chance for the community to unite and celebrate our town's unique history and heritage.

"This year's Discovery Festival program is packed full of exciting events, with plenty of activities and attractions for children and families," she said.

"It is set to be a big weekend for Broome, with the festival's individual events scheduled around the Broome Turf Club's first race round for 2021 also."

"However, I'd also like to remind the community that construction work is still continuing in some areas of Chinatown but we hope the impact is minimal."
